The Ohio University [Alumni] Association

A Brief [History]

Ohio University boasts more than 175,000 living alumni across the nation and around the world. More than 95,000 reside in Ohio; 4,000 live overseas. The Ohio University Alumni Association provides a channel for their support of the University. **Membership in the Alumni Association is automatic for graduates and all those who complete at least 45 hours of study at Ohio University, at no charge.**

The first recorded attempt to organize the University's alumni began with Archibald Green Brown on June 29, 1853. Judge Brown, an 1822 alumnus and active member of the Athens community, sent a circular by Pony Express and stagecoach inviting alumni to a social reunion on campus.

Due to the scarcity of graduates, Brown experienced many difficulties in trying to organize the association. Between 1815 and 1865 the size of the class varied from one to thirteen students and in 1835 there were no graduates. By 1857, the University directory listed only 171 alumni.

Despite setbacks, on June 2, 1859, a group of alumni met and formed a committee to elect officers and write a constitution of the association. Brown, now acknowledged as the "Father of the Alumni Association," held the position of president in 1860, 1862, and from 1876-1880. In 1872, he continued his service by becoming the first person to initiate fundraising efforts to promote the university.

The first alumni chapter of the Alumni Association was established in 1906 in **Pittsburgh**; the second was formed in Columbus in 1909. During the formation of these two chapter networks an alumni secretary position was established to maintain records of alumni – a move which greatly facilitated the growth of the Alumni Association.

The year 1915 marked the centennial of the first graduating class of Ohio University in whose honor the Alumni Gateway at the Court Street entrance to College Green was dedicated. Donations from alumni made construction of the gateway possible.

The first full-time alumni secretary was appointed in 1922, and Clark E. Williams, a 1921 graduate, served the association in this position until 1954. His appointment – and his personal dedication – brought another surge of activity to the growing source of alumni relations. Among projects that Williams initiated was the *Ohio Alumnus*, and alumni newsletter that covered current University activities and alumni programs.

One of the first activities Williams directed was a campaign to raise funds to construct the Alumni Memorial Auditorium. After four years of careful planning and successful fundraising, the auditorium was dedicated on January 20, 1929.

In 1954 Ohio University sponsored a drive for scholarship endowment funds as part of the celebration of the University's sesquicentennial. The drive, which had a \$150,000 goal, raised more than \$500,000 and marked an important milestone in the modern development for the Alumni Association. This drive also led to the formation of the Ohio University Foundation (formerly the O.U. Fund, Inc.). Since that time, growth has continued with the University completing another successful capital funds drive in the late 70's.

In January 1994, it was announced that over \$132.7 million was raised in gifts and commitments to the University's capital funds drive, The Third Century Campaign. This surpasses the original goal of \$100 million by over \$32.7 million. Funds raised during the campaign went to support "people programs," rather than bricks-and-mortar building activities. Of the amount raised, \$47.3 million went to academic support, \$26.2 million to student support, \$17.1 million to the Athens campus, and 49.4 million to annual giving.

The most recent campaign ended in July of 2004. The Bicentennial Campaign launched in November 2000, with a goal to raise \$200 million in celebration of the university's 200th anniversary. Going more than 11 percent over goal, the campaign, raised \$221,442,916 to support students and faculty, innovative programs, technological enhancements and select capital improvements. All told, more than 85,000 people and organizations made nearly 250,000 individual gifts during the campaign. Of the total raised, \$23.1 million will establish eight new endowed chairs and 35 new named professorships to support continued excellence in teaching and research. In a time of escalating tuition costs, \$40.1 million will support many existing scholarships as well as create 1,226 new scholarships - including 68 Cutler Scholarships. The campaign raised \$17.6 million for new or improved capital facilities, \$29.3 million for innovative programs, and \$13.9 million in technological enhancements.

[Timeline]

- **1859:** Alumni Association founded and constitution approved by the University. Dr. Archibald Brown, "Father of the Alumni Association," served as alumni secretary.
- **1872:** Alumni Association becomes an incorporated entity with a newer focus of securing permanent funds to aid in the endowment of the University.
- **1906:** Alumni Association forms its first alumni chapter - the Ohio University Alumni Association of Pittsburgh. Cabin B. Humphrey, '88, served as president.
- **1908:** Ohio University had 635 graduates.
- **1921:** First assembly of the Alumni Association's Board of Directors, then called the "Board of Control."
- **1922:** Alumni Association published first alumni information bulletin (magazine).
- **1922** marked the beginning of the Association's campaign to build the Alumni Memorial Auditorium. Alumni secretary Clement L. Martzolff initiated the project.
- **1927:** Alumni campaign to fund the Alumni Memorial Auditorium ends. Over 3,112 subscriptions had been made.
- **1933:** Alumni meet the challenge of recruiting students for the University. Ohio University's enrollment was up while other schools (Ohio State, Wisconsin and Illinois) reported sharp decreases.
- **1939:** Ohio University Women's Club of Greater Cleveland assembles, founded by Ruth Fowler Brown, '31.
- **1940:** Akron Women's Club forms on April 13.
- **1941:** Ohio University graduates, students and faculty join the country's defensive forces to protect the homeland.
- **1959:** Les Carney, '59, was the first Ohio University graduate to compete in the Olympic Games, earning a Silver Medal.
- **1966:** Cutler Hall is dedicated as a National landmark.
- **1966:** Ohio University changes to quarter calendar.

- **1967:** Alumni Association establishes 50th alumni chapter and increases number of alumni serving on Association's Board of Directors.
- **1971-72:** Ohio Governor eliminates support for funding grants that negatively affected the Association and University. Enrollment greatly decreased.
- **1978:** Creation of the Alumni Association Travel Program.
- **1978:** Establishment of the Student Alumni Board by Barry Adams '74, '83.
- **1979:** University leadership merges Alumni Relations and Development.
- **1980:** Dr. Wilfred and Ann Lee Konneker purchase the General Charles H. Grosvenor victorian home located next to the Good Shepherd Episcopal Church for use as new alumni center. Before the purchase and donation of the home, the Alumni Association had been housed in Lindley Hall.
- **1981:** The Ohio University Foundation dedicates the Konneker Alumni Center.
- **1985:** Greater Cleveland Alumni Chapter is established.
- **1996:** Greater Dayton Alumni Chapter celebrates its 50th Anniversary with a year long celebration.
- **1999:** The inaugural full-color edition of *Ohio Today* is published.
- **2003-2004:** Ohio University celebrates its Bicentennial.
- **2004:** Dr. Roderick J. McDavis is inaugurated as the 20th president of Ohio University, becoming only the second alumnus in the University's history to hold this position.

Alumni Association Sponsored [Initiatives] and Programs

Alumni Chapter Networks: An alumni chapter network represents a geographic area in which 500 or more alumni reside, which may organize bylaws and apply for charter through the Ohio University Alumni Association Board of Directors. Alumni chapter networks are established to help promote the interests and welfare of Ohio University and its alumni. Chapter networks offer services and activities to promote alumni engagement.

Regional Contact Program: This recently developed program is designed to identify alumni who will be able to organize activities in areas where Ohio University does not have a critical mass of alumni.

Alumni Societies: Alumni societies serve the University through their respective colleges, departments, or special interest constituencies by providing quality leadership training, communications support, and organizational guidance. Societies exist to promote the interests and welfare of Ohio University and the Ohio University Alumni Association

Reunions: Reunion programs were traditionally based on class year (i.e. 10th, 25th, 35th, and 50th anniversaries of graduates). Today, the Golden Reunion and "Special Era and Interest" reunions have become the annual events. "Special Interest and Era Reunions" accommodate groups of a particular time period or groups that share a particular interest or experience. Examples of such reunions might include: "Classes of the 50's" or the Black Alumni and Marching 110 Reunions.

Homecoming. A very special fall weekend, the traditional homecoming celebration provides alumni and their families with the opportunity to return to their alma mater in the height of fall campus activity. Alumni have a chance to celebrate by attending the Alumni Awards Gala, an exciting pre-game festival, an Open House at the Alumni Association, the parade, the football game, college and constituent receptions, and many other special events and activities.

Bobcat Bashes: These pre-game events are held one and a half to two hours prior to game time at various home and away athletic events. These energizing tailgating socials promote pride and excitement in support of the OHIO Athletics program. Those attending have the opportunity to enjoy music and food with special guests and VIP's of Ohio University, including staff, administrators and coaches from the Office of the President to OHIO Athletics.

Advocacy: Advocacy is the support of Ohio University at the State and National levels. Whether it be writing an email to a legislator via our Society of Advocates in support of an Ohio University priority, attending an Ohio University rally, keeping up on current issues effecting the University, or talking proudly about your alma mater, Advocacy is meant to preserve and better the institution for future generations of students while increasing our national prominence.

VAAN: Ohio University's Volunteer Alumni Admissions Network (VAAN) represents a major effort on the part of Ohio University to expand, increase, and refine its student recruitment activities. It further represents a commitment by the university, the Office of Admissions, and Alumni Association to future excellence of the institution. We realize that alumni, parents of Ohio University students/graduates, and others who have been positively touched by the university have a great deal to offer in terms of knowledge, skills and expertise. The VAAN program allows Ohio University to effectively utilize those attributes and abilities with the university's recruitment efforts. Through Ohio University's Volunteer Alumni Admissions Network, the Office of Admissions can increase its contact with prospective students, and as a result, increase its chances for maintaining a stable and diverse enrollment.

Mentoring Programs The Office of Career Services and the Ohio University Alumni Association have teamed up to provide current Ohio University students with the opportunity to get connected with an alumni mentor. Mentors are Ohio University grads in a similar field of work as the student they're mentoring would like to enter. Mentors assist students in a number of ways, including but not limited to: talking about career choices, advising them on how to get started in their desired career, conducting mock interviews, introducing them to valuable business contacts, and sharing tips of the trade as students' transition from college to the professional world.

The Student Alumni Board: The Student Alumni Board (SAB) is one of several outstanding student organizations at Ohio University. SAB was established in 1978 by Barry Adams '74, '83, former Alumni Association Director, and is dedicated to enhancing student-to-alumni relationships. SAB provides a variety of services intended to promote the Ohio University Alumni Association's mission and encourage students to participate in the educational and social functions of SAB. The organization's goodwill is made possible by the diverse programming sponsored by the SAB leadership and the creative, hard-working membership of its board.

Senior Class Council: Senior Class Council (SCC), sponsored and advised by the Ohio University Alumni Association leadership, annually provides direction and advice for members of the graduating senior class. Through SCC programming and outreach, Ohio University students benefit from efforts that include discounted rates from select local merchants, graduate receptions, career assistance receptions with alumni, and a host of other "life-transition" programs. In addition, SCC chooses a class gift and assists the University's president in the selection of the commencement speaker.

Special Benefits

Alumni Tour Program: The Alumni Association sponsors both domestic and international trips to exciting destinations on the average of 18 times per year. Destinations include the Canadian Rockies, the Amazon, China, Italy, Russia and more. For more information, visit www.ohio.edu/alumni/travel

Awards Programs: Special recognition is acknowledged annually to distinguished alumni and friends of Ohio University. Sponsored by the Alumni Association and presented at the annual Alumni Awards Gala, these include: Alumnus/na of the Year, Medal of Merit, Distinguished Service, Honorary Alumnus/na, and Recent Graduate. Other awards include: Outstanding Chapter Network, Outstanding Society, Most Innovative Chapter Network, Best Reorganized Chapter Network, Most Improved Society and Outstanding Chapter Network Program.

Affinity Programs: The Alumni Association sponsors a number of special services such as life, health, and automobile insurance, major credit card service, a career service data bank, official school ring, the Ohio University Alumni Association desk lamp, diploma frames, license plates, pewter collectables and signature wines. Many of the Associations affinity programs and services are made possible, in part, through productive partnerships with a host of vendors specializing in alumni association management. These trusted relationships permit the Association to add value to its membership.

Ohio University Alumni Association Web site: The Ohio University Alumni Association's Web site [www.ohio.edu/alumni] is an ideal starting point for all Ohio University graduates and chapter leaders. View the Calendar to see what events are happening in chapters and societies around the world. Advocate for Ohio University and stay current on issues that effect campus life in Athens (and the branch campuses) with the Advocacy section of the Ohio University Alumni Association's Internet home. Take advantage of the Association's Benefit Services and Professional Development, both of which have pages within the site.

The current Ohio University Alumni Association Web site is in transition and will be revised during the summer months of 2005. Our new Web site will be unveiled in early fall of 2005 with lots of new content, including InCircle, an exciting networking tool that will let alumni connect in a whole new way. We are incorporating an online event notification element into our web plans to further benefit alumni and Ohio University Alumni Association chapter networks and societies. Additionally, look for enhancements to our current alumni online directory and to our online store [Bobcat Marketplace].

Chapter Web sites: The Alumni Association will generate an account and template for each chapter or regional network that requests the creation of a website. These websites are created through an online module with the PCI Data Company, and are hosted free of charge through the Association. This module allows leaders to easily and efficiently create a chapter website. The Association does not maintain the content of the web pages for the network. The chapter or regional network should indicate the alumni leader who will serve as the webmaster, who will be responsible for maintaining and updating the chapter webpage. It is suggested that you have a primary webmaster and one additional leader who is tasked with updating changes in the event that the webmaster is unable to make changes in an appropriate length of time. This module does not

require knowledge of html; however, html can be used to enhance the content and display.

The [college] Gate: This regional newsletter is published quarterly and includes information about alumni chapter networks/societies, events and programs in eleven regions throughout the world. These regions include five inside of Ohio (Northwest, Northeast, Southwest, Southeast and Central), five outside of Ohio (Northwest United States, Northeast United States, Southwest United States, Southeast United States and Midwest United States) and International. The [college] Gate is received by all alumni via email or USPS mail, dependant upon the information we have on file.

Making Tracks: Making Tracks is a monthly html email sent to alumni in the respective alumni network's region/area the first week of each month for additional event and program promotion.

Online Directory: The Online Directory allows alumni to get in touch with fellow graduate via the Ohio University Alumni Association web site. This tool allows simple and secure searches for alumni information. The directory's contents include all alumni with the exception of those who have requested that the University not release their information.

Frequently Asked Questions [FAQs]

How do I become member of the Ohio University Alumni Association?

The Ohio University Alumni Association is a non-dues organization; therefore it is not necessary to join the Association. All graduates and attendees (those who have successfully completed 45 or more credit hours) are considered members of the Alumni Association.

What are the benefits of membership?

Membership in the Ohio University Alumni Association helps you network and stay connected with graduates, former students, the Ohio University Alumni Association and Ohio University. There are special services and products available to alumni, and great events both on and off campus throughout the year.

Is there an Alumni Association membership application?

No application necessary, but we ask that you call us at (740) 593-4300, or fax us at (740) 593-4310 for all address and information updates. Or if you prefer, visit www.ohio.edu/directory to update your information with your online directory.

Is there a chapter in my area?

There are 44 alumni chapter networks worldwide and 22 alumni societies that help you stay connected with Ohio University. Visit the Alumni Association Web site at www.ohio.edu/alumni/ to locate a chapter in your area.

How can I get in touch with my local chapter network?

A list of Ohio University Alumni Association chapter networks and their contact information is available on the Alumni Association's Web site at www.ohio.edu/alumni. If there is not a chapter network in your area and you would like to start one, call the Alumni Association at (740) 593-4300 or send an email to alumni@ohio.edu.

I understand that the Alumni Association keeps records of all Ohio University alumni, what kinds of things might be in my record?

Information we collect is your home address, current contact information (assuming you have contacted the Ohio University Alumni Association, or visited online directory via the Alumni Association website), in addition to information where you work and any volunteering you have done (as long as this information has been reported). The Division of University Advancement also subscribes to a newspaper-clipping service; so many alumni records contain news accounts, such as wedding announcements, job changes and promotions. Also included is information you submitted when you returned reunion questionnaires, surveys and attended association events.

How far back do alumni records go?

In many cases, all the way back to 1804.

How many living Ohio University alumni are there? Do most of alumni live in Ohio?

Ohio University's living alumni total approximately 175,000. Over 95,000 live in Ohio, while the other 45% live throughout the world.

How can I get more involved with the Alumni Association?

The Ohio University Alumni Association's mission is to connect, inform and serve the University, its diverse alumni and friends through strong leadership, dynamic programs and effective communication. There are dozens of Ohio University Alumni Association-sponsored programs and activities that accomplish these goals. Chapter Networks: There are approximately 44 alumni chapter networks worldwide that sponsor a variety of activities, including guest speakers from the University, social and business networking events, athletic activities, community service projects, university service events, freshmen "send-off" receptions and admissions receptions.

Regional Contact Program: This recently developed program is designed to involve alumni in areas where we do not have a critical mass of graduates. It is our hope that interested individuals will assist the Alumni Association in multiple areas of volunteerism, including welcoming new students, providing mentoring or career development and representing Ohio University at local events.

Volunteerism: You can volunteer in class reunion planning. You can volunteer for leadership roles in chapter networks or societies, or plan an event. You can become a member of the Volunteer Alumni Admissions Network (VAAN) or mentor an Ohio University student.

Educational Opportunities: You can participate in enrichment programs, seminars and tours offered by the Alumni Association.

Leadership: You can become a regional contact or a leader of a chapter or society.

Society or Special Interest Groups: You can participate in programs and events held for college societies or special alumni interest groups such as the Army or Air Force ROTC, cheerleaders, LGBT, or the Marching 110

How is the Ohio University Alumni Association different from the Ohio University Foundation?

The Alumni Association is a non-dues dependent alumni organization that supports the University, fosters alumni fellowship and provides information and activities. The Alumni Association is financially supported by the University and the Foundation.

While advising university officials and encouraging all activities that promote the University and its alumni, the Alumni Association supports the Office of Development, which handles university fund raising.

Can I visit the Alumni Association office?

Where did the support come from to pay for Konneker Alumni Center and its furnishings?

In 1980, a generous gift from Dr. Wilfred R. and Ann Lee Konneker provided funds for the purchase of the house by the Ohio University Foundation. In honor of Dr. Konneker and his gift to his alma mater, the Foundation dedicated the new alumni center on Homecoming Day 1981, naming it the W.R. Konneker Alumni Center.

Does the Ohio University Alumni Association offer group health and life insurance?

When is Homecoming, what events are planned, and are fall reunions on Homecoming Weekend?

My daughter wants to go to Ohio University, but I don't know if her grades are good enough; what does it take to be admitted these days?

Competition is rigorous. General requirements for freshmen include good high school grades, academic courses and satisfactory SAT scores. For more information about admissions, contact the Office of Admissions at (740) 593-4100.

What is the current cost of attending Ohio University?

For 2005-2006 undergraduate in-state tuition and fees are \$8,235, per year and out-of-state tuition and fees are \$17,199, per year. The estimated, in-state, average cost of room and board for the academic year is \$7,686.

How are children of alumni judged in the admissions process?

The degree to which having a parent who is an alumnus or alumna helps an applicant to be admitted varies from year to year and is governed by the Admissions Application Review Committee.

Will a relative's chances of being admitted to Ohio University improve if I make a contribution to the University?

No. When considering undergraduate applications, the Admissions Offices' key criteria are class load, course difficulty, extracurricular activities and SAT/ACT scores.
